Board Meeting Policy

"Summertime - and Living is Easy".....

Unless you're the one in charge of the Barbecue. So here are a few marinades to make the cooking just a little tastier:

Basic Barbecue Sauce:

(Good for meat or chicken)

- 2 1/2 cups ketchup
- 1/3 cup orange juice
- 1 Tbsp ground cinnamon
- 1 Tbsp maple syrup or honey
- 1 1/2 Tbsp soy sauce
- 1 1/2 Tbsp Worcestershire sauce

Mix all ingredients and taste for seasoning. Use to marinate; brush on additional sauce during

cooking.

Oriental Marinade:

(Good for fish or chicken)

- 1 cup reduced-sodium soy sauce
- 3 Tbsp ginger
- 2 tsp. sesame oil

Mix together, pour over fish or meat, coating well. Marinate at least 1/2 hour before grilling.

Steak in a Bag: (also great for chicken)

- 2 cups water
- 1 cup teriyaki sauce
- 1 tsp. black pepper
- 1/2 cup dark molasses
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1/2 tsp. onion powder
- 2 Earl Grey tea bags

Combine the water, teriyaki sauce, black pepper, molasses and spices in a saucepan. Bring to a boil. Add the tea bags. Let sit until cool, then remove tea bags. Put the steaks in a big zip-top plastic bag. Add the marinade. Seal tightly. Refrigerate until ready to grill.

Arlene's Marinades:

a) Steak Marinade (good for 2-3 rib steaks or shish ka-bob)

- 2 tsp. paprika
- 2 tsp. dry mustard
- 1 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 1 1/2 tsp. onion powder
- 1 tsp. white pepper
- 1 tsp. thyme
- 1 tsp. cumin
- 3/4 tsp. black pepper
- 1/2 tsp. cayenne
- 3 Tbsp balsamic vinegar

Pound steak thinly and let sit in marinade at least 1/2 hour in the refrigerator.

b) Chicken Marinade

- 3/4 cup fresh lemon juice

8 cloves of garlic (or 1 large head), pressed

2 Tsp. dried thyme

1 Tbsp paprika

1 1/2 tsp. ground cumin

3/4 tsp. cayenne pepper.

Marinate chicken at least 1/2 hour.

Gardening Corner - donate Iris to the Shul!

If you have noticed that your bearded Iris (Iris Germanicus) is not flowering as prolifically as it should, then it probably needs dividing. This is generally done in July/August, when Iris are dormant. You may remember that before the original shul garden was "bulldozed", there were Iris growing there. When you divide your Iris, you will probably have divisions over. The shul can use them!

Shiva Asar B' Tamuz is Tuesday, July 22.

"The Seventeenth of Tammuz - Five tragedies occurred on this day:

- a) The Tablets(of Law) were destroyed (because of the worship of the Golden Calf).
- b) Preceding the destruction of the First Temple, the daily Temple offerings ceased.
- c) Preceding the destruction of the Second Temple, the city of Jerusalem was conquered.
- d) Afustumus, the Wicked, burnt the Torah.
- e) An idol was placed in the Holy Sanctuary.

During the Three Weeks between the Seventeenth of Tammuz and Tisha B'Av, it is proper to minimize rejoicing. Ashkenazic custom dictates that weddings and other celebrations are not held in this period. Both the Sephardic and Ashkenazic communities refrain from dancing and playing music at this time. (Nevertheless, a professional musician may work for gentiles until Rosh Chodesh Av.) Certain communities abstain from eating meat and drinking

wine in this period. Generally, however, these restrictions are not enforced until Rosh Chodesh Av. Just as a mourner does not cut his hair or shave, it is customary to refrain from doing so during these three weeks. One should refrain from hitting children at this time.

The prophet Isaiah declared, "Zion will be redeemed with judgment and those who return to her, through charity." The commentaries explain that in this context judgment refers to the study of Torah and in particular, Halacha. In these weeks, accentuated by the memory of Jerusalem's downfall, we must increase our efforts in those activities; Torah study and gifts to charity, which will bring about her redemption. In particular, it is appropriate to study the laws relating to the construction of the Temple, for in the Medrash's words, "when Jews study the laws of the Temple, Hashem considers it as if they are involved in its construction."
